Message Title – What Did Jesus Do? Hanging Out With All the Wrong People.

Scripture Reading – Mark 2:13-17

Offering Meditation – Dave

The Regional Office sent out an email on Saturday encouraging people to order a commemorative church camp T-shirt, which will help to offset the lost revenue because of the cancellation of this summer's weeks of camp. Hurstbourne Christian Church announced they were making a large donation to help Camp Wakon' Da-Ho. I want to challenge our congregation to help our church camp at this time. Church camp has been important to so many of us — youth and adults — so I am writing out a check this morning and asking you to consider doing the same.

On my key chain is a small medallion, and in the middle of that medallion is a very tiny seed; too tiny for you to see from where you are sitting. It is as mustard seed. In Matthew 17:20, Jesus talks about the power of *faith as small as a mustard seed*. Sometimes, I wish my faith were as large as this tiny seed. But however large or small we believe our faith to be, faith is faith. We often see what we have in terms of scarcity; God always speaks in terms of abundance. Even when we believe we have little – little in terms of faith or resources – in God's hands, it is much.
