As you are well aware, the number of Covid cases in Shelby County and in Kentucky have been very high in the past several weeks. Message Title – A Tough Faith For A Tough Time: Moses

Scripture Reading – Exodus 3:1-12a

- ¹Now Moses was tending the flock of Jethro his father-in-law, the priest of Midian, and he led the flock to the far side of the wilderness and came to Horeb, the mountain of God.
- ² There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in flames of fire from within a bush. Moses saw that though the bush was on fire it did not burn up.
